Phrases & Clauses

 Phrase: group of related words that does not contain a subject and verb and is used as a part of speech

 Clause: a group of words that contains a subject and a verb and is used as part of a sentence or a sentence by itself.

Adjective Phrase

 An ADJECTIVE PHRASE is prepositional phrase that is used to modify a noun.

Example:

Adj: Icy chunks fell from the sky.

Adj. phrase: Chunks of ice fell from the sky.

Adj: I ordered a spaghetti dinner.

Adj. phrase: I ordered a dinner of spaghetti.

Adjective Phrases Cont'd

- Sometimes there will be two adjective phrases in a row
 - The two phrases COULD modify the subject (noun)
 - Ex. I love the <u>painting</u> of flowers by Van Gough

OR

- The second adjective phrase could modify an object in the first adjective phrase
- Ex. A <u>number</u> of the <u>paintings</u> by Van Gough are in US museums.

Clause

- A word group that contains a subject and verb
- Two types of clauses:
 - Independent
 — expresses a complete thought & can stand by itself as a sentence
 - Dependent-(subordinate)-does not express a complete thought & cannot stand by itself as a sentence

Dependent Clause

- A clause that has a subject + verb BUT does NOT express a complete thought + CANNOT stand alone as a sentence.
- Start with SUBORDINATING CONJUNCTIONS

Independent Clause

 A clause that has a subject =+ verb + expresses a complete idea + can stand by itself as a sentence.
